



Informational: The Role of the APNIC Secretariat in the PDP

Historical Situation

- At one point it was not unusual to have members of the APNIC secretariat propose policies under the APNIC PDP
 - The documentation prefix,
 - 4 byte AS numbers,
 - the original IPv4 transfer policy.





Present Situation

• It is not clear if it is acceptable for members of the APNIC secretariat to bring policy proposals to the wider APNIC membership for discussion under the existing PDP.





Advantages

- APNIC host-masters and other secretariat members are in a unique position of dealing with the implementation of the APNIC policies on a day by day basis.
- They will be among the first to notice any problematic activity caused by current policy
- Enabling them to engage with the PDP is a positive way to bring these problems and associated solutions to the members.





Disadvantages

- It could be argued that a level in separation be maintained between the APNIC secretariat and the PDP.
- I believe however that as the PDP is such a robust member driven process there are no concerns with proposals being initiated by APNIC staff.
- All proposals would still require a consensus from the APNIC membership before they are implemented.
- Eg. NZ Public Servants can propose changes to Government policy. They do not however play a role in the decision making process around the adoption of that proposal
