

Discussion Session: Internet Cooperation



Montevideo Statement – Oct 2013

- The leaders of organizations responsible for coordination of the Internet technical infrastructure globally met in Montevideo, Uruguay and considered current issues affecting the future of the Internet
- The statement conveys in particular an agreement on "the need for ongoing effort to address Internet Governance challenges", and a commitment to "catalyze communitywide efforts towards the evolution of global multistakeholder Internet cooperation"

Montevideo Statement – Key Points

- Warned against Internet fragmentation at a national level
- Concern over the undermining of the trust and confidence in the Internet
- Encouraging community-wide efforts towards the evolution of global multistakeholder Internet cooperation
- Accelerating the globalization of ICANN and IANA functions
- Transition to IPv6 should remain a top priority globally

APNIC EC Statement – Jan 2014

 The APNIC EC resolved to ratify and support the Montevideo Statement and set out the APNIC position on those issues raised in the statement

Globalization of ICANN and IANA

- The primary interest of APNIC is in the ongoing stability and reliability of the global number registry functions, which are provided by IANA
- These registries must continue to be operated in a manner that complies with the global policy development processes of the Internet community, and which responds to the concerns of the Internet technical and broader communities
- APNIC supports the operation of IANA's global number registry functions by ICANN
- We would seek greater transparency in this arrangement, by establishing an improved agreement with ICANN under which specific IANA functions will be provided
- APNIC is also interested in ICANN's ongoing evolution towards a globalized structure that places no government or other party in a privileged position

Internet Cooperation

- APNIC recognizes and affirms the multistakeholder nature of Internet coordination, cooperation, and governance
- APNIC supports the Internet Governance Forum (IGF) as the agreed venue for these matters to be advanced
- The healthy functioning and evolution of the IGF is important to APNIC

Transition to IPv6

- Internet content providers must serve content with both IPv4 and IPv6 services, in order to be fully reachable on the global Internet
- APNIC is pleased to see ongoing progress in IPv6 deployment globally
- APNIC EC remains committed to actively supporting IPv6 until there is no doubt of success in the global deployment effort

Brazil meeting: "NetMundial"

- Announced in October 2013, after Montevideo meeting
- Followed strong statements from President Rousseff
- Now scheduled for Sao Paolo, Brazil, 24-25 April
- Pre-registration closes today (28 Feb 2014)
- "Executive Management Committee"
 - AP regional participation, including Akinori Maemura
- Public submissions close 8 March
 - "Principles"
 - "Roadmap"

NetMundial – draft submission points

On "Principles"

- "Internet Governance" is well-defined and accepted
- The multistakeholder model has been recognised as critical to Internet's success
- Unique characteristics of the Internet must be maintained: global, open, end-end, neutral, etc

On "Roadmap"

- The IGF should continue as the forum for IG discussions
- The IGF should evolve and be strengthened, through the IGF process itself
- "Globalization" of ICANN and IANA should continue to progress

/1net: discussion forum

- During the Internet Governance Forum in Bali, efforts were made to engage with a broad community to strengthen the multi-stakeholder Internet governance framework.
- An email list 'i-coordination@nro.net' was launched for this purpose.
 There were 27 subscribers to this list then.
- The objectives evolved into an "open, global online discussion about Internet governance", under a platform named /1net. The original mailing list transitioned into 'discuss@1net.org' in December 2013.
- By today, the [discuss] mailing list has around 700 subscribers:
 (614 non-digested and 105 digested members)

/1net: discussion forum

- There is an active debate in the /1net platform.
- Discussion is evolving, from definitional aspects towards more substantial topics.
- Preparations for the meeting in Brazil is an important topic.
- /1net can also be an "inter-sessional" IGF platform
- Voices from the Asia-Pacific region need to be shared and heard in this space!!
